

The Joy of Leadership

The Three Elements of a Successful Ministry

The feature in this May-June issue of *GoFish* is the third in a series on elements for a successful ministry. The first two elements, VISION and STRUCTURE, were addressed in the January-February and March-April issues, respectively. This issue will focus on the third element of LEADERSHIP. It makes sense that even if you have a wonderful vision, and you have a structure or plan in place to see that vision realized, you still need people to implement the vision within the structure—in other words, you need good leadership. In fact, it is easy to see how all three elements form a sort of tri-pod. You can't have one without the other two.

Jesus as Model

During youth leadership events, we often re-enact the "washing of the feet" as found in the Gospel of John. Jesus showed his disciples that servant-leadership is what his ministry was all about. He demonstrated for them, in a very clear way, the attitude of humility and service which characterizes true Christian leadership. We are asked to "put our gifts at the service of one another" (1 Peter 4:10.) And, indeed, leadership is a gift. Whatever level of leadership you may be experiencing in youth ministry, it is truly a blessing from God. And you have been asked to share that gift with others. We have a perfect model in Jesus. And much more than merely a model, we have the assurance of the Holy Spirit to inspire us, and support us, and guide us in our ministry. "Do not let your hearts be troubled." (John 14:1.) Remember, whatever God has called you to, He will bring you through.

The Joy of Leadership

This assurance of God's abiding presence is the joy of being a leader in Catholic Youth Ministry. We have been given so much—the gift of faith, the treasury of our Catholic tradition, and the joy of the Spirit burning in our hearts—that we are fairly bursting to share the reason for our joy with others! God has called each of us to serve Him in some way. What better way to serve than to lead young people to an intimate relationship with Jesus Christ? It is a privilege and an honor to give back to God the blessings He has bestowed upon us. And, then, to be able to do that in the company of enthusiastic, faith-filled, amazing young people—well, that is just icing on the cake!

Share the Joy

Every adult in the faith community has a part to play in this invitation to young people for discipleship—it is not the exclusive role of a youth minister or CYO advisor. 

TEN WAYS TO FIND AND SUSTAIN VOLUNTEERS

The following are 10 principles to build support for your Youth Ministry. Some examples were given, but there are many more examples for each.

- 1) Have a Contagious Vision for Your Ministry
- 2) There is No Recruiting Season
 - Every day is an opportunity for invitation and ministry growth
- 3) All Volunteers Deserve A Clear, Specific and Written Job Description
- 4) Bill Gates Model of Ministry: Make it User Friendly
 - Place people according to their passion and talents and not your need
- 5) Provide Stimulating & Interactive Training and Formation
 - Create multiple avenues for volunteers to network
- 6) Build A Ministry Family
 - Invest 30% of your time getting to know and serving your volunteers
- 7) Families That Pray Together, Stay Together
 - Provide for the spiritual needs of volunteers
- 8) Control Freaks Make Terrible Leaders
 - In the same way God wants to use you, He wants to use others
- 9) Affirmation Comes in Many Forms
 - People first. Paper & programs second.
- 10) Let the Parish Know What You Are Doing
 - Community Knowledge + Community Investment = Community PR = More Volunteers

National opportunities:

LEADERSHIP FOR EFFECTIVE YOUTH MINISTRY

The following recommendations were made for coordinators of parish youth ministry in book *Effective Practices for Dynamic Youth Ministry* and have been paraphrased here:

- 1) Create time for your own spiritual growth
- 2) Tap into the community and support of other youth ministry leaders in your area
- 3) Make use of local and national resources for you and for the youth of your parish
- 4) Develop a team of adults and youth in your parish to coordinate youth ministry and help shape the vision and plan for your ministry
- 5) Provide ongoing training opportunities for the adult volunteers of your parish to strengthen their skills and nurture their spiritual development.
- 6) Provide leadership, teaching and ministry opportunities within the youth ministry program for youth
- 7) Continue your own education to develop skills through diocesan training programs, certificate training programs, and other programs.
- 8) Strengthen your relationship with other leaders in the parish, (pastor, parish staff, etc.) to enhance collaboration and improve communication and awareness.

LEADERSHIP ROLES IN YOUTH MINISTRY

Within a parish youth ministry, there are a variety of leadership roles for adults. It would be helpful to keep these various roles in mind when recruiting adults for youth ministry. Each role involves varying degrees of involvement. Here are some suggested roles and their descriptions:

- 1) **Coordinator of Youth Ministry.** This is similar to the role of a D/CRE within a parish. Just as the DRE identifies, trains and supports the catechists in the parish, the Coordinator of Youth Ministry helps to facilitate the gifts of the parish to fulfill its ministry to youth. This facilitation includes working with adults and youth on a team, and helping to infuse the youth into the life of the parish.
- 2) **Youth Ministry Team Member.** Adults on the youth ministry team work with the Coordinator and youth representatives to oversee the vision and evaluation of the parish youth ministry efforts. Team members may or may not be program leaders—but usually in smaller parishes they serve in both roles. This team continues to monitor the youth ministry by considering the “Big Picture.” (For example, the TEC Core Team oversees the health and development of the TEC community, but may or may not be currently serving on TEC weekends.)
- 3) **Program Leader.** This person is responsible for a specific youth ministry effort, whether it is a program, activity or event. Depending upon the scope of the effort, a team may be assembled by the Program Leader to assist in the implementation of the effort. (For example, a Program Leader for a Dinner Theatre may assemble a team of adults and youth for grocery shopping, cooking, decorating, set-up and clean-up, talent, ticket sales, etc.)
- 4) **Program Planning Team Member.** Adults who serve on program teams mentioned above.
- 5) **Support Staff.** These adults support the parish youth ministry by serving as chaperones, cookie-bakers, drivers, etc.
- 6) **Advocates/Links.** These adults are members of the parish and larger community that support the efforts of the parish youth ministry. (For example, the local high school principal might be supportive by considering the youth ministry calendar when planning major events such as prom.)



THE ANCHOR

The girls were all admiring each other in their beautiful white dresses and veils. The boys had cleaned up nicely in their suits and ties. It was First Communion day at our parish. The Gospel that Sunday was the story of Jesus and Thomas. Thomas doubts that Jesus is risen and declares it will take quite an experience for him to believe. The next time Jesus drops by, he calls Thomas forward. "Put your fingers here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe."

I've heard that story many times, but sometimes something new will jump out at you. And that day, I thought: "Whoa. That's pretty personal. Putting your hand in someone's side? Doesn't get much closer than that." And here we were, gathered to celebrate these children entering into an even deeper closeness with Jesus. The Gospel finished with Christ encouraging us, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Though he said it 2,000 years ago, Jesus was delivering a message directly to these kids!

These children come dressed in their best with hearts overflowing with faith: "This is Jesus!" But often, as the years pass, it becomes harder for them to see with the eyes of the heart. Our witness is so important to them! We must continue to bring them to the Blessed Sacrament. The feast of Corpus Christi (June 10 this year) is a great reminder of how we must follow Christ. The tradition on this day is for the parish to process around the block, behind the priest carrying the Eucharist. It is a bold witness, both to the next generation and to people who happen to drive by ("Look at those crazy Catholics! Following that gold container! Why are they doing that?!")

Even if your parish doesn't practice this custom, this summer can be a time to become like a child again. He waits for us to come to him, to draw near to him, to follow him. He waits with grace to pour out. He waits with a vision to impart. For He is the Source and the Summit. May we cry out like Thomas, "My Lord and my God!"


